Examples of small block farm animals are:  Smaller breed beef cattle eg Highland cattle, Galloway cattle, Dexter cattle; All miniature cattle; Miniature horses; Heritage pigs; Kunekune pigs; Small breed sheep; Miniature goats; Alpaca, Llama etc etc	We have over 20 years of experience running Highland cattle. These are a smaller beef cattle and compared to eg Angus beef cattle, Highlands weigh in at approximately half the body weight. Their calves are born tiny and grow more slowly than regular cattle, taking three to four years to reach adult weight. They cannot be directly compared. If we ran our Highlands to the beef cattle stocking rate of 12 stock units per hectare we would have to mow our paddocks to control the grass.
				Miniature cows are even smaller.
				We would recommend that including all these smaller breeds as stock units in the definition perhaps by providing alternative weight ranges, will be much more accurate for the purposes of this proposal, particularly for 4-20ha farms.
