Request for information 2024-144

I refer to your request for information dated 2 July 2024, which was received by Greater Wellington Regional Council (Greater Wellington) on 2 July 2024. You have requested the following:

- I. "What was your council spend on emergency management capability, and how many staff members did you have within emergency management roles, for the previous 3 financial years.
- II. How much is your council budgeting to spend on emergency management capability, and how many staff members will you have within emergency management roles, for the current financial year (1 July 2024- 30 June 2025)"

Greater Wellington's response follows:

Greater Wellington Regional Council is part of a consortium of Wellington regional local authorities that established the Wellington Region Civil Defence Emergency Management Group as a joint standing committee of the Councils pursuant to section 12 of the Civil Defence Emergency Management Act 2002 (the CDEM Act).

On 23 March 2012, the Joint Committee agreed that the councils' Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) departments shall be amalgamated to achieve a more coordinated CDEM service delivery. Their operational responsibilities shall be delivered through one body to be known as the Wellington Regional Emergency Management Office (WREMO).

Greater Wellington's contribution is 33% of the total WREMO funding.

As well as the WREMO capability and capacity, Greater Wellington also has its own emergency management responsibilities under the CDEM Act 2002. Greater Wellington's spend on emergency management capability, and the number of staff members we have within emergency management roles, for the previous three financial years, is as follows.
